Resits for English Language and Maths:

November also provided an opportunity for students to resit their English Language and Maths exams. Results for these will be available for collection from the Exams Office on 9th January from 8am. Controlled Assessments & Upcoming Exams:

In the past month, we've also facilitated Controlled Assessments for Criminology, and we're already planning ahead for the New Year. This includes managing the French and Spanish speaking assessments, taking place in January, as well as preparing for the second round of PPEs for Year 11 and Year 13, taking place in February. Year 8 Science – Biomechanics models

Sixth Form Literature trip to see 'The Tempest'

On November 26th some of our Sixth Form English Literature students had the opportunity to attend a live performance of Shakespeare's The Tempest at the Palace Theatre in Southend. This experience proved to be a magical and enthralling interpretation of one of Shakespeare's most complex plays, leaving students captivated from beginning to end.

The production truly lived up to its "thunderous" reputation, with stunning visual and auditory effects that brought the tempest itself to life. The combination of UV lighting and sound design set a dramatic and immersive tone that resonated throughout the performance. The portrayal of Prospero was masterful, balancing authority and



vulnerability, while Ariel's ethereal presence enchanted the audience with fluid movements and haunting vocals. Adding levity to the drama were the humorous antics of Trinculo and Stefano; their witty exchanges and physical comedy had the audience laughing out loud.

Our Sixth Form students left the theatre with a deeper appreciation for The Tempest and the power of live theatre. This visit not only enriched their understanding of the play in preparation for their Literature A Level examination, but also demonstrated how Shakespeare's work continues to resonate and entertain centuries after it was written.

Religious Studies Update

It has been an exciting term in Religious Studies as we roll out our new curriculum for Years 7, 8, and 9. Focusing on enquiry and deep questioning, our students have grappled with how we answer ultimate questions, evaluated the responsibility of religious figures in challenging injustice and inequality in society, and discussed whether it is possible to answer the question of God's existence.

Year 7 students made a brilliant start to life at Mayflower High School by considering the reality of miracles, among other key areas of religion. Year 8 students researched their favourite religious figures and how they challenged injustice. Year 9 students spent time debating the merits of the ontological argument versus the teleological argument. Year 10, our first option cohort, has finished their studies on Christianity and is now debating how Christianity and Buddhism respond to issues of social justice in the world, particularly surrounding topics such as prejudice and discrimination. Year 11 students have completed their GCSE content, and with their PPEs finished, we now have a good overview of where to target revision in the new year.

Finally, Year 12 has tackled different ethical theories of behaviour and discussed the existence of God, as well as the problem of evil and suffering and Year 13 have completed their philosophy and ethics units and are ready to take on key topics such as Christianity and science and the challenge of secularisation.

It has been a calendar year full of change in Religious Studies, but it has been an exciting journey, and we are raring to go in the new year! Mr Wallen

Drama Department

Year 7 have been studying Pantomime this half term and have enjoyed playing a range of stock characters and practising slapstick! Year 8 have been exploring Shakespeare and have worked through a range of rehearsal techniques used by the RSC to explore text, character, theme and plot. Year 9 have been exploring the style of Verbatim theatre and have looked at extracts of different plays that use real words for the basis of the narrative.

Classes are enjoying the range of drama games we play, these are excellent for team building, boosting confidence, improving communication skills and often develop focus and self discipline and are great for our well being.

Key Stage 3 students have been working hard on their half termly drama homework and we have been very impressed, particularly with the range of Lego building and design work! We are keen to extend student's learning beyond the classroom and have designed homework tasks that allow for either practical or paper based work. Year 10 Drama GCSE have explored a variety of plays and are developing their analysis skills when writing about acting and directing.

We are very excited to be announcing the next school production! 'Guys and Dolls' auditions will take place in January and rehearsals will be underway by February ready for performances in the summer term. Students can sign up for auditions in the drama studio: Year 7 and 8 are on Monday 13th January 3.30-4.45pm and Year 9,10 and 12 are on Tuesday 14th January. 

Duke of Edinburgh Presentation Evening

Mayflower was delighted to host a DofE Award presentation evening on the 13th November. The event saw over 100 students being presented with their Bronze and Silver awards in a ceremony hosted by the school DofE Manager Mr Griffiths, the DofE Regional Manager Matthew Wheeler, the DofE Leaders and Head Teacher Mr Lee.

To gain their award the students needed to complete a range of activities including volunteering in the local community, taking part in a wide range of physical activities and learning new skills. They also took part in the expedition section, where they developed new skills such as overnight camping, navigation, teamwork and outdoor cooking.

During the awards evening the students were presented with their certificates and badges by Mr Lee who spoke about the long-lasting and positive impact of the DofE Award. He also thanked all the staff that have given up their time to support the expeditions, and also the parents and carers for supporting their young person to achieve their award.

Congratulations to all those that have completed their award and are an inspiration to new students considering taking part in the DofE system.

DofE Induction Day

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is a life-changing experience. It is a fun time with friends and an opportunity to discover new interests and talents. It is also a way to develop essential skills for life and work and is a recognised mark of achievement which is respected by employers.

Mayflower enjoys a long history of running successful DofE awards and this year has been no exception.

On a damp Saturday in November over 100 Year 9 students attended a DofE induction in the library. They spent time learning about the award, how to login into the eDofE app and register all their sections. This year's cohort of bronze participants are taking part in an extensive range of activities, which include rugby, first aid, cooking, martial arts and volunteering at the Billericay park run.

The eDofE system is a convenient way for participants to manage their progress online via a browser or app. They can upload evidence of their activities, check progress and when finished their sections can upload the assessor's reports. We look forward to working with this years cohort to guide them through the award and to celebrate in their success on completion



Geography Curriculum update

This term **Year 7** have completed the 'Geographical Skills' unit, finishing with the opportunity to apply this to a decision making exercise choosing where to build a new housing estate in Billericay. They have now moved on to investigate the difference between weather and climate, and will be carrying out their first fieldwork enquiry soon.

Year 8 completed a unit looking at 'Why rivers are important?' Where they studied flooding in the UK and Bangladesh. They carried out their first fieldwork in the school grounds, investigating infiltration on the school site. Year 8 are now investigating the challenges and opportunities of changing population.

Year 9 have enjoyed their unit 'Are cities becoming too densely populated?' They focused on London and Masdar and completed a task to design a sustainable city. Year 9 have now moved on to a hazards unit 'Will we ever know enough about earthquakes and volcanoes to live safely?'

Starting their GCSE this term, Year 10 have now completed the 'Urban futures' unit where they studied Birmingham and Lagos as their case studies. They have also completed their first fieldwork enquiry deciding if the regeneration of Chelmsford city centre has been successful.

In addition to sitting the first of the PPEs, Year 11 have studied 'Global Hazards' focusing on weather and tectonic hazards. They are now learning about development with a focus on Ethiopia.

Year 12 have completed the first of four fieldwork days required for their A level Geography. The day trip to Southwold introduced them to fieldwork skills for both the physical and human elements of the course and they are considering what they would like to investigate for their NEA.



The NEA has been the main focus for Year 13 with them writing up their findings from their fieldwork from the summer term. They are now looking at climate change for their Geographical debates paper and Global migration for the Human paper.

The Geography department is always actively encouraging students across year groups to read around the subject. We have incorporated some key texts into our schemes of work this year and would encourage students to read Geography related texts in their own time. It would be great if parent(s) and carer(s) could ask students about what they have been studying and help them to develop their geographical knowledge, understanding and skills. Linking the subject to the real world by keeping up to date with news at a local, national and international scale is a fantastic way to start discussions. A few recent examples are the impact of Storm Bert on the UK and COP 29.

Our Students Shine at Essex Chemistry Mastermind 2024

We are delighted to share the success of four of our talented students, Ruby (Year 11), Athina (Year 10), Alfie (Year 9), and Erin (Year 9), who represented our school at the Essex Chemistry Mastermind competition. Organised by the Royal Society of Chemistry and hosted at the University of East London, this event brought together some of the most promising young scientists in the county. Our students rose to the occasion, showcasing their skills and teamwork in a competitive environment.

Featuring three rounds, the competition was a true test of scientific ability and teamwork. The day began with the Knowledge Round, where the students worked in pairs to tackle a challenging written test, combining their expertise to solve chemistry problems. Next came the Team Challenge, which tested their collaboration and problem-solving skills through a series of tasks. Finally, the Practical Round saw the students working as a team in the university's cutting-edge labs, conducting a hands-on experiment that required precision and teamwork.

Alongside the competition, the students had the chance to experience university life. They toured the campus, exploring the incredible facilities, and interacted with Chemistry undergraduates and staff. It was a fantastic opportunity to gain inspiration for their future studies and careers in science.

Ruby, Athina, Alfie and Erin demonstrated a fantastic commitment to their learning and an impressive ability to work together under pressure. Their success highlights the potential of our students and sets an inspiring example. Congratulations to the team on this wonderful achievement.

Design and Technology

This half term our students have been creative and making their projects which are due for completion in the next half term.

A select few Year 8 students attended a trip to the Ford factory in Dunton. Students could see how the Ford factory works and how to work as a team in order to reach an end goal. They could see the workings of the factory, gain knowledge and even see cars being tested. The trip was enjoyed by all who attended and they could not wait to discuss the trip further on their return.





Year 9 Students have been refining and building on the skills they have learnt in previous years, in order to create a functioning grabber. Students so far have shaped two lengths of pine, made the handle, trigger and jaw. They have now been demonstrating independent practice by working through the parts and assessing them to check for quality and accuracy. After the holidays students will be starting to make the last part and assemble the grabber. An excellent start to the project has been made with some clear talent for GCSE options too.

Year 10 students have now completed their Christmas reindeer in time for the festive season. Students have learnt about cutting materials using templates for accuracy. Using hand tools and machinery safely to achieve the product, they have even been given creative opportunities to create accessories for the reindeer aswell as applying a finish to it. 
