As the first half term draws to a close it is always good to reflect on the significant improvements that the school has made and celebrate the contributions made by staff and students.

There have been an array of trips, visits and extra curricular clubs that have given students opportunities to enhance their learning and enjoyment outside of curriculum time. These tend to be the memories that last a lifetime and from having visited students on day trips and residentials I have seen first hand the excitement it gives them as well as the chance to develop key learning skills such as resilience and determination. These skills can be transferred to their day to day learning.

On October 5 we had a really successful Open Evening where we hosted over 2400 visitors - this is a significant increase on previous years and has been accompanied by facilitating daily tours for year 6 families over the course of the first half term. We have conducted over 200 tours for year 6 students and parents and have received overwhelmingly positive praise and feedback from their visits.

At the end of September we asked parents to complete a survey on their views of the school. We used the same questions that parents answered prior to the Ofsted inspection in April 23 which allowed us to get some really strong comparative data. The results were positive in all areas and indicate a real change in confidence from our key stakeholders. Some of the significant improvements were;

Child is happy at school April 23 - Strongly agree/agree 64% Sep 23 - Strongly agree/agree 91%

School makes sure pupils behave well April 23 - Strongly agree/agree 31% Sep 23 - Strongly agree/agree 78%

Recommend this school to another parent April 23 - 44% Sep 23 - 82%

Whilst these results are really strong I want parents to know that we continue to strive to improve the school further. The next term sees some exciting changes to further enhance the teaching and learning and continue to push standards in behaviour.

As we lead up towards Christmas, after half the half term break Year 11 students will start their first round of PPE - mock examinations. I wish them all well and urge them to continue their hard work and efforts as well as dedicating a good balance of revision and time to enjoy a bit of a rest.

I'm not one to usually highlight individual success but it would be remiss of me to not mention Maggie Shepherd in Year 11. Maggie was selected to represent England in Gymnastics 13-15 October. This is a huge achievement and everyone at Mayflower is proud of Maggie and her achievements at such an elite level.

Thanks to all students, staff and parents for their support this term. I wish you all an enjoyable and safe half term.


Billericay Blizzard's Success



Before my attendance at the Conservative Party Conference I wasn't sure what to expect. A group of stiff and grey haired old Etonians came to mind, which was true in some places, but generally I felt free to be proud of my state education. The delegates on a whole were far more concerned about policy and ideas, and I was able to engage in a wide variety of intellectual conversations in the mere two days I was there. I found in order to avoid said old Etonians, and a great amount of careerists, one has to visit the huge array fringe events where the truly intellectual discussions take place.

I went to an incredibly captivating talk on homelessness, which had no political affiliation at all. It began with a very powerful speech came from a man who was formerly on the street, and now is on universal credit. Every week he has to choose one essential over another which is the same of 90% of people recieving universal credit. It really allowed me to learn without the, in some cases, confusion of political narrative and spin. Directly after that I went into The Home Secretary's speech where I was subjected to the hyper-conservative, wrath of Suella Braverman on immigration and "STOPPING THE BOATS!", one of the biggest real life oxymorons I had experienced. Her speech was an insight into the ideology of those on the right of the party and displayed the disparity in ideas across the members: centrist and almost liberal. In that mind, the great disparity allowed me to form a critical eye, and grasp a greater understanding of political ideas across the spectrum, and thus formulate my own opinion - which I shall not divulge.

Dyslexia Team Building Day at Stubbers Activity Centre-29/9/23

Every year the year 9 Dyslexia Centre students are tasked with the challenge of organising a team building day for all the Dyslexia Centre students and staff. This year it was Alfie Kay, Tony Bowers and Alfie Woolmer's turn and they managed to organise a highly successful day at Stubbers Activity Centre. This year, this involved making phonecalls, costing the trip as well as designing questionnaires for students, staff and parents to investigate interest in a variety of activities across year groups, before grouping students and booking preferred activities.

Friday 29th September was spent overcoming a fear of heights by scaling a vertical assault course and climbing a tower for the leap of faith, descending into the darkness of the underground caves, rifle shooting, axe throwing, honing team tactics in laser tag and working strategically as a team on the banana boat rides.

All students had a fabulous day and thoroughly enjoyed learning outside the classroom. David Brace, 9B1, said 'Stubbers this year was amazing and I thoroughly enjoyed it. My favourite activity was the banana boats and laser tag because they were both thrilling and competitive. We learned lots about working in a team and determination.'

It was lovely to see friendships develop across year groups. These friendships will likely remain and provide support throughout their Mayflower journey at school.

It was great to see students' confidence grow in this outside environment and see perseverance, teamwork and kindness towards one another develop over the course of the day. All students returned home exhausted but happy!

Design and Technology

It has been a busy and productive half term in the DT department with projects underway in all years. From year 7 starting their first wood work project to year 11 starting the design phase of their NEA (an exciting time when the products start taking shape) here is just a sample of what students have been doing in the department.

Year 7

In year 7 students have learnt how to use basic hand tools to mark out their MDF with accuracy, this has included measuring in mm and leaving waste space to allow for errors when cutting. Then using a try square in order to draw straight line, a phrase we use in the department frequently is a ruler is for measuring and a try square for drawing straight lines. Students then checked their work twice with the help of their teacher with the phrase "check twice cut once" before they were allowed to cut their material with a tenon saw. These pieces will make the stand of their mechanical toy. Students are now in the sanding and shaping stage for the stand of the toy.







Year 10

In year 10 students have begun to learn unit 3 of the AQA specification which focuses on materials. This will give them the valuable knowledge they will need throughout the 2 year course. To support this they have also had two practical opportunities a fortnight. One focuses on CAD (computer aided design) where they use the programme 2D design in order to create a simple keyring design which will then be cut on the laser cutter. Students are shown how to load the laser cutter and programme it as a valuable lesson they will be able to use throughout the course.

In a more "hands on" practical lessons they have been making Christmas reindeer out of plywood. Students are shown the rough template they need in order to create the reindeer and then cut the pieces to size. The pieces are then sanded using glass paper, disk sander and the bobbing sander in order to smooth and shape the pieces. Students could then get creative and shape the antlers and feet of their reindeer. We have started this early so they will be able to take it home for the Christmas season finished to a good standard and varnished.









Textiles & DT Club

Meanwhile in both the Textiles and DT Club students have been busy getting creative making decorations to sell at the PTFA artisan market with hopes of raising money. In the DT club students have been using tinkercad in order to 3D print decorations and 2D design to laser cut decorations. In the Textiles club we have been handsewing felt decoration and making pom poms. Here are some of the behind the scenes photos.





Year 7 students have been introduced to what Geography is and have produced some excellent posters:-










Year 8 students have started the unit 'Why are rivers important?' They have produced some excellent leaflets and posters:-

I have seen the struggles he faces on a daily basis and how it impacts his life in so many ways but he has never let it get him down and I find his determination to keep going despite his worsening condition inspiring. One big reason I chose to do 750,000 steps as my challenge is that my uncle used to love going for walks/hikes but now he cannot walk without a frame or using a wheelchair so I really want to push myself to keep walking for him. I hope to be able to make a difference in the lives of those living with or affected by MND.

Key Stage 3 and 4 Achievements

At the time of writing this report our students have received an amazing 23,558 merits for their efforts both inside and outside of the classroom compared to 17,512 for the same period last year. We have been really impressed with the way that our students have conducted themselves this term and have really demonstrated our core values in the number of merits that they have received.

Positive Signatures

Students can receive positive signatures by any member of staff in our school for displaying our values outside of the classroom, for example holding a door open, helping another student, being kind. Students record these signatures on their student card and receive a fast pass into the canteen.

Merits

Merits can be awarded inside and outside of our classroom for; Participation: for example in assemblies, clubs and competitions. Excellence in our community: for example, taking part in D of E or receiving a Jack Petchey award. Work Ethic: for example excellent effort in their homework,

participation in class. Core Values: for example being kind to another student or being responsible around school. Merits are recorded by students on their student cards every week and parents can view both merits and behaviour points on the Sims Parent App.

Certificates and badges

Certificates will be awarded in assemblies and are usually calculated twice every half term. They are based on conduct points which are achievement points minus behaviour points.

Achievement badges will be awarded in our end of term celebration assemblies and vouchers will be drawn for students with the most merits.


