


Year 11 Rugby - Billericay Rugby Club

Year 10 Bronze Expedition (Groups 1-17) 3-5 May 2024

When we arrived at Danbury campsite, ducks greeted us in the puddles on the field, setting a theme for the first day filled with continuous heavy rain that had the potential to dampen everyone's spirits. However, the students demonstrated remarkable resilience, setting up their tents and attending briefings in the extremely difficult conditions. Despite the campsite quickly turning into a mud bath resembling a festival site, the students remained undeterred. They completed all tasks asked of them and even had time for a good-humoured 'mud slide' football match before settling down for the night. Saturday morning brought a completely different atmosphere as the sun shone brightly for the students starting day one of their qualifying expedition. They completed 6 hours of activity, embarking on a 15km walk through the Essex countryside before returning to the campsite to cook their dinner. The sun continued to shine on Sunday as they completed their second walk, marking the final day of their expedition section, and the group was rewarded with a 100% pass rate from the assessors.

The students' behaviour, teamwork, resilience, and good nature were something to be extremely proud of, and they undoubtedly made memories to last a lifetime. A heartfelt thank you to all the staff who generously gave up their time so the students could have this invaluable opportunity.













Design and Technology

This half term, students across the years in KS3 have been making progress on their new projects, aiming to complete them before the end of the summer term. We are hopeful that in the next newsletter, we will have some finished products to showcase.

In Year 7, students have made further progress with constructing the torch circuit. This has involved learning how to use the soldering iron safely, with an important lesson on what to do in case of burns. They have demonstrated pride and care in their soldering work and have engaged in problem-solving to identify issues with the circuit and why it may not light up during testing, with assistance from the class teacher.

Remarkably, Year 7 has exhibited some of the best soldering skills we have seen as a year group, resulting in a record low number of students' circuits failing to light up on the first try. Well done to all involved! The next stage involves constructing the case for the circuit to sit in.





In Year 9, students have completed the helping hand/grabber project with both Mr. Fowler and Miss. Miles and are now transitioning to the lamp project. Before delving into designing the lamp, students have been introduced to various design strategies commonly used in the industry to enhance the design process. Additionally, they have learned how to manipulate card and paper using a variety of techniques to create 3D products.

The results thus far have been truly impressive, with outstanding work showcased by students such as Archie Cushing, Isabella Currie, Charlotte Bilby, Juliet Wenborn, Harry Showell, and Heidi Webb. Their creations exemplify creativity and craftsmanship, setting a high standard for the rest of the class.











Well done to everyone in KS3! As we look forward to the next term, let's continue the momentum and dedication in finishing our projects. Together, we will create something we are proud of and eager to take home. Keep up the great work!

In KS4 with Year 10, we have initiated investigations into materials and techniques, such as wood joints and laminating wood, across all classes. By honing these skills and techniques through practical application, students will be equipped with a comprehensive range of information that they can utilise for their NEA (Non-Exam Assessment). Following their practical lessons, students have been tasked with writing about the materials or techniques they have explored, drawing upon their newfound knowledge and prior understanding to inform their decision-making process when crafting their NEA product.

As we eagerly anticipate the announcement of this year's NEA topic in June, we are excited to dive into it here in DT and apply our skills and knowledge to create innovative and high-quality projects.


